GLEN DECKER: PHRAGMIPEDIUMS

hragmipediums are the New World's primary contribution to the orchid hobbyist obsessed with Slipper Orchids. Strikingly similar to their Old World cousins, Paphiopedilums, yet remarkably different, these Central and South American Slippers have undergone a renaissance during the last decade. Up until 1981, Phragmipediums, or Phrags, available to the hobbyist were characterized by a fairly limited range of colors—soft greens and browns predominated, with one species that ranged from white to pink. And then came *Phragmipedium besseae*, discovered in Peru in 1981 by Elizabeth Locke Besse, while on an expedition for the Marie Selby Botanical Gardens. *Phragmipedium besseae* is brilliantly colored in hues that range from deep to scarlet red, to orange, to even salmon and yellow, and its introduction into horticulture has revolutionized hybridization within the genus. Now the

red to bright yellow, in addition to all those green and brown-hued hybrids & species, some with petals that reach over two feet in length.

or this Sunday's meeting, November 2^{ND} at 2^{PM} , CNYOS is pleased to have Glen Decker of Piping Rock Orchids as our invited speaker. Glen's presentation will be on the genus Phragmipedium, and will feature slides of Phrags in their natural habitat—including the coveted & controversial Phrag. kovachii, the newest discovery that has the potential to revolutionize Phragmipedium horticulture in a way not seen since the arrival of Phrag. besseae. Phrag. kovachii boasts flowers that range in color from pink to purple, and is better than twice the size of any other Phragmipedium species known to date. Plans for lunch or dinner with our speaker are uncertain at this time—for more information, see page 2. Glen will be bringing plants to sell. Hope you can make it!

CNYOS SHOW COMMITTEE

For future shows we've decided to take a new approach, by setting up an ongoing show committee. There will be more discussion at the meeting on exactly what the committee's responsibilities will be.

SPOT LIGHT ON...

Laelia eyermaniana & Oncidium ornithorhynchum

Laelia eyermaniana (or perhaps x eyermaniana) comes from the Mexican west coast and is often assumed to be a natural hybrid between Laelia albida and Laelia speciosa. It is found growing both epiphytically and occasionally lithophytically at altitudes between 1050 and 2500 meters. Indeed, it is often found growing in the same tree as both albida & speciosa, lending credence to those who believe it to be a naturally occurring hybrid. However, taxonomists tend to be split on this plant, and many believe that it is a species in its own right. Regardless of its origins, the result is a floriferous Laelia with 3" lilac flowers situated on tall inflorescences. The form of the flowers is slightly cupped. To grow eyermaniana, provide intermediate to cool temperatures and very bright light (full sun, although the species is adaptable to growth under artificial lights). It is probably best grown mounted, which allows the roots to dry out between waterings. appear in late summer into autumn. If L. eyermaniana is a natural hybrid between albida & speciosa, it is arguably an improvement over at least one of the purported parents; L. albida is a delightful plant (to be featured here soon) that produces smaller white fragrant flowers and is relatively easy to bloom, but the magnificent *L. speciosa* tends to be recalcitrant in both growth and flowering.

Although in a different league than the Laelias discussed above, *Oncidium ornithorhynchum* is a Central American orchid that no collection should be without! Ease of culture and a free flowering nature make this orchid an ideal subject for growth on the windowsill or under artificial lights. Grandparent to the immensely popular *Onc*. Sharry Baby, *ornithorhynchum* is much more compact, demands less light, and is just as fragrant! Grow on the cool side of intermediate, with ample water while in active growth. A unique hybrid was produced by our own Rich Groll's father, who crossed *Onc. ornithorhynchum* with Howeara Mini Primi to produce Howeara Leila Groll (named for Rich's mother). The result was a flower of the form of Mini Primi, with the pink colors and fragrance of *ornithorhynchum*!
