Ars Botanica (This article was published in last Sunday's New York Times Magazine)



When I was about 12, my grandmother went to work for rich people as a live-in governess. I don't know what rich people do on Sundays, but they're never home. So all of us — my parents and my brother and I — would go visit my grandmother where she worked.

I grew up in a typical three-bedroom, two-bath house in a little subdivision in Fort Lauderdale. But this house where my grandmother worked had a winding driveway with palm trees on either side. It was a two-story Spanish Colonial on Biscayne Bay, and in the back it had a pool and a cabana. I thought, People live like this? I

had no idea. Right then I decided that maybe someday I could design my own house. Then I could have this. I still don't have my dream house, but soon, soon.

My grandmother, Mary — anything she stuck in the ground was going to grow. My dad would call me little Mary; like her, I always had a vegetable garden out in the yard. When I was in college, in north Florida, I joined the bromeliad society, a tropical-plant group.

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My obsession with orchids, though, began when I moved to St. Thomas in the fall of 1987. The next spring, there was an orchid show at Bluebeard's Castle Resort. When you walked in, the perimeter was lined with foldup tables with plywood partitions two feet deep and three feet wide, where members of the orchid society displayed their plants. I remember big Oncidiums — they had a long spray with little side branches and little yellow-and-brown flowers the size of a nickel. Dancing Lady Orchids, they're called.

That's where I saw it — a New Guinea Dendrobium, creamy yellow with little brown spots. The weirder and stranger something is, the more I tend to like it. And that one was weird. It wasn't your typical corsage orchid. It probably cost about \$8. I decided I had to have it.

I've since gone to orchid shows where I could have easily spent \$3,000. Picture a room the size of a Kmart, all orchids. I brought a list of what I wanted, tropical plants I'd seen in books and from visiting botanical gardens. Gongoras, Stanhopeas — they're bizarre. Most people have never heard of these orchids before. Encyclias are fabulous. Oh, they're intoxicating, they smell so good. Some bloom only once a year, at Mother's Day. You know it's a one-time shot, and you enjoy that one time. There's always something coming. And there's always something going.

This all started pre-Hugo; in the Virgin Islands, we date things by the hurricanes. In 1993, I bought a house - then I didn't have to grow my plants in pots anymore, as when I was renting. I could put them all in the ground and on the trees where I wanted, across two acres.

The guy who was with me for a long time helped build a lot of my garden. He was big on wanting to tie the orchids up in the trees. After 20 years together, he went his own way, but I kept on. The garden was where all my money went. I went from having just the Dendrobium to more than a thousand orchids. I didn't invest in anything else. So when the market crashed, I still had my plants. They did not crash, you know.

As I found homes for each plant and built pathways through the property, I started to think that St. Thomas needed a botanical garden. Maybe I could turn this obsession into a business. It would be a way of justifying my insanity.

In the meantime, I want the trees literally dripping in orchids. There's just something about them that hooks you. That's Brassavola nodosa, they call that Lady of the Night. During the day it's pretty, but at night it smells really good. Its pollinators are moths that come out only at night. The moon reflects off the white flowers, and then it sends off this scent; the moth finds it and pollinates it.

Orchids grow in virtually every type of climate and on every continent in the world except Antarctica. If something wants to grow in the Himalayas, it might grow here, but it will never bloom. From that first orchid that I bought at Bluebeard's Castle, I had to make sure I was buying for St. Thomas.

I bring them back here, put them on a tree and say, "Grow," and they just grow. Up here on the mountain, even if it doesn't rain at night, it gets so cool that the moisture condenses, and the orchids get water out of the air that way. I just put them up there and leave them alone. They do their thing.

I just opened this place as a botanical garden. I hope the orchids will help me build my fancy house, finally. But this is already home. If I found you growing in nature, where would you be living? High on a tree? Low? Would you be living where it's really sunny? Where it's really shady? That's what I think about with the orchids.
