# Minutes – CNYOS Meeting November 1, 2009

Tom Daily opened the meeting at 2:10 PM by welcoming the club members and announcing we would be discussing the October 2009 Show results:

- 1. Tom thanked all the members who helped with the show. He noted it was a beautiful show and everyone's hard work was much appreciated.
- 2. Carol presented the Treasurer's Report. Currently, the club has a balance of \$3096.03 in our account. Carol reported that though we did not make a profit on our CNYOS Show (Show expenses exceed show income to date by \$686.55), this is an improvement on last year's show, where our expenses exceeded income by over \$1200. Carol is still expecting one additional commission check, so she expects the final show income/expense number to be adjusted further. All show expenses and donations are reflected in the number above.
- 3. Tom reported that, this year, the club relied on "gratis" advertising in local newspapers and periodical publications. He congratulated the Advertising Committee for a great job (David Ditz and Lori Hoffman). David Ditz reviewed the show notices and publicity articles we received in the various publications. Tom asked David and Lori to make up a list of contacts that they used for the 2010 Show Advertising Committee.
- 4. Iris Cohen reported that the show registration and awards process went smoothly this year and she has trained several new volunteers to help with this task.
- 5. Dolores Capella suggested that we consider eliminating several of our existing memorial awards. These awards were started as a memorial for club members who had passed away. Dolores questioned that these awards should be continued indefinitely past the memorial year of the death of the member, unless the award was endowed from a source outside the club or was for a charter member (over 20 years membership) of the club. After a brief discussion, Dolores made a motion that there would be no additional annual memorial show awards made for any deceased member, who has belonged to the club for less than 20 years at the time of death. The motion was seconded and passed by a show of hands.
- 6. Charles Ufford asked people to consider what type speakers and programs they would be interested in seeing at upcoming meetings. He passed around a sheet for members to write down suggestions.
- 7. Tom asked for volunteers to serve as officers and committee chairmen for the new membership year. For 2010, we need a new president, vice-president/program chairman and show chairman. The president is responsible for leading and coordinating the talking points for each meeting. The vice-president schedules meeting programs and speakers and stands in for the president, when absent. The show chairman will be responsible for coordinating the 2010 CNYOS Show. If anyone is interested in these positions, please contact Tom.
- 8. We need volunteers to bring refreshments to our future meetings. A refreshment sign-up sheet was passed around.
- 9. We discussed whether or not members can brings plants and supplies, etc. to sell at meetings. David Ditz made a motion that members can bring orchid-related items to sell to any meeting with "no agenda" (a meeting with no speaker or no workshop, where plants will be sold by the speaker or by an outside vendor as part of the workshop). This motion does not change the rules governing our two auction meeting months. The motion was seconded and passed by a show of hands.
- 10. Our next meeting is December 6 and will be our Christmas potluck party. Tom reminded everyone to bring a dish to share.

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11. November 7, Saturday, is a field trip to Marlow's Orchids in Rochester for Jim Marlow's Open House. We will carpool as usual. All interested members will meet at St. Augustine's parking lot at 10AM.

## Trip to Jim Marlow Orchids

Eleven members made the trip to Jim Marlow Orchids Open House on a beautiful Fall Saturday. We were rewarded by delicious food and a greenhouse full of tempting orchids. Each one of us left with at least one potential prize winner tucked away. Thanks to Jim for always making the trip a worthwhile excursion.

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I'm going to try to include occasional tips for beginners in the Orchid Enthusiast. The following article is from the AOS.

## Why won't my orchid rebloom ?

Insufficient light is the most common cause of failure to re-bloom your orchid. Leaf color indicates if the amount of light is adequate. The lush, rich, dark green of most houseplants is not desirable in orchid leaves. A grassy green color (light or medium green with yellowish tones) means the plant is receiving sufficient light to bloom. The orchid on the left shows the correct leaf color and is producing abundant blooms, the plant on the right has dark green leaves and no flowers. Orchid plants need sunlight. Light is used to turn moisture and nutrients into plant growth. A good rule is to give your plants as much light as possible without scorching. While too much light may damage the plants, too little light will prevent flowering or cause weak growth.

Too much sunlight is indicated by scorched spots on the foliage or pseudobulbs where the sun hits directly. Rarely does sunburn discolor an entire plant, only the portion of the green parts that is hit by direct sun for too long a period. Increased light should be given gradually. Burn damage is caused when the plant tissue gets too hot. If a leaf feels hot to your fingers, it may be burning. If you can cool down the leaf temperature with moving air and water, then the light can be brighter without doing any harm. Morning sun is more beneficial to plants than afternoon sun. Therefore your growing area should be located to get maximum sun and light early in the day. A windowsill chosen for orchids should face east or south.



## **Orchids'** Deception

How do you spread your genes around when you are stuck in one place? By tricking animals!! Michael Pollen in an article in the National Geographic says that ..."Orchids forced me to revise my estimation of what a clever plant is capable of doing to a credulous animal."

Here is one example published in the October 2009 Smithsonian Magazine:



Why would hornets pounce on an orchid that has no nectar? By mistake, say researchers working on China's Hainan Island. They found that *Denrobium sinense* flowers produce a chemical that mimics alarm phermones emitted by honeybees. Hornets, which prey on the honeybees, smell the fragrance, attack the orchids – and inadvertently pollinate them.

And here are two more examples from the September 2009 National Geographic Magazine which show that orchids use different ruses to attract different pollinators:



To affix a yellow pollen sack to a male sand bee, a wild Italian hybrid dresses up as a female bee.



To recruit a butterfly for gene distribution, an *Epidendrum* in Panama imitates milkweed, a favorite food.
