Minutes – CNYOS Meeting January 11, 2009

Tom Dailey opened the meeting at 2:30PM by welcoming members and guests:

- 1. Tom Dailey is our new President for 2009. Dolores Capella and Charles Ufford will be serving as co-Vice Presidents. Carol Haskell will continue her hard work as our Treasurer. Congratulations and thanks to new and returning officers!
- 2. Carol Haskell presented the Treasurer's Report to the club. The club's current balance is \$2710.38. The final figure for the 2008 CNYOS Show' net profit/loss is -\$1268.16. Our biggest show expense was for advertising. Carol also reminded everyone that dues are now due and should be paid to her \$15 for a single membership, \$17 for a family membership.
- 3. Tom Dailey asked the club to consider if we still wanted to hold our annual show in 2009, after considering the treasurer's report of the results of the 2008 CNYOS Show. The club voted to hold a show in 2009 at the Beaver Lake Nature Center by a show of hands. The club also discussed how to cut back on show advertising expenses. David Ditz and Laurie Hoffman volunteered to co-chair the show advertising committee and investigate the suggested options.
- 4. The club also agreed to continue holding the show during the Fall. Cheryl Lloyd will contact Beaver Lake to get a list of open weekend dates for our 2009 show.
- 5. We also need a show chairman and volunteers to serve on the various show committees. Judi Witkin sent around a sign-up sheet for show committees during the meeting. Tom will call an executive committee meeting if necessary to discuss other show issues and bring recommendations before the membership.
- 6. Charles Ufford mentioned that we have been having a very large number of plants at recent meeting plant raffles, where we also had speakers who brought plants to sell. The raffles may have detracted from the plant sales made by the speakers. He suggested we dispense with the plant raffle when a speaker is coming with plants to sell. The club voted in favor of this motion.
- 7. Judi reminded the members that our plant auction will be held at our May meeting. She will send out letters requesting plants from various vendors.
- 8. Charles is setting up the speaker schedule for the coming year. He asked that members contact him with any suggestions about speakers or topics they would enjoy.
- 9. Tom would like members to consider what our club's goals should be. He wanted to know if we should consider a contribution for an orchid conservation program and if we should raise club dues for 2010 or leave them at current rates. He asked that members contact him by phone or email.
- 10. Tom also asked if we wanted to return to our old style of handling the show table during the meetings. Previously, each grower with plants on the table would talk about their plants and describe how they cared for them during the Show Table portion of the meeting. We have not followed that procedure consistently recently. The club agreed by show of hands that they liked that idea.
- 11. Eva Galson asked if we were continuing with the Beginner's Round Table prior to the start of our monthly meeting (1:30PM 2PM). Judi said she would be glad to organize the round table discussions. She will make up a list of subjects to cover for the 2009 meetings and ask various members to chair the round table for each meeting. Iris Cohen volunteered to do a beginner round table on plant labeling and nomenclature.
- 12. The club also discussed asking club members who have extensive experience growing specific plant groups or specific orchid-growing experience to consider being a meeting speaker.

Communication from the president of AOS, Carlos Fighetti

Back to Basics

Economic uncertainty is forcing us to look into our operations and determine which are the most important services to our membership and hence come up with a new strategy to weather the storm. For this to happen, we need to set priorities.

To the majority of our members, Orchids magazine is the most important reward of being members of this organization. So, our top priority is to publish a quality magazine, and we intend to continue to do this. As I explained in last month's column, in order to reduce the cost of production, we made some changes. The width has been slightly reduced to get better use of the paper at the printer, and the number of pages has decreased. Also, the cover finish has been changed and the binding replaced by the original saddle stitch type that the AOS Bulletin had. All of this provides us with enough savings to allow us to continue with a monthly publication. Our second priority is AOS judging. Again, this is an aspect of high importance to a great number of our members as they exhibit orchid plants everywhere. Many of you may not be aware that orchid flower and plant judging occurs every month at 35 different sites in the Unites States and Canada and routinely more than 700 AOS judges and student judges participate. In addition, AOS judging occurs at orchid shows throughout the United States as well as all over the world. We are committed to support all of these activities as usual by quarterly upgrading our AQ Plus® computer program that contains all awards statistics and images since judging was started in 1932, and by providing the necessary paperwork support and processing of all awards in a timely basis.

Third, our Web site will continue to receive our attention as many of our members and orchid growers in general worldwide use electronic media to access information on all aspects of orchidology. Through the Web site we will be able to disseminate information on how to grow plants, provide articles of interest in all orchid aspects and provide news about the organization. Also, articles that we cannot place in our magazine for lack of available space will appear on www.aos.org.

This does not mean that we are going to forget about education, conservation and research. On the contrary, this is our mission, and we are committed to continuing to foster the passion for orchids. It only means that for the time being we will not be able to provide additional grant funding for these activities.

What we are facing today are extraordinary economic times with no clear end in sight. After a year of holding a steady membership level, we are starting to see a decline again. Also, contributions to our general fund for operations have substantially decreased. All of this has forced us now to do what we are doing. It is our Board's responsibility as leaders of this organization to preserve our resources so that the organization continues to exist as it has done for 88 years. Consequently, we have decided to concentrate on the activities listed above. We have significantly reduced our staff at the Delray Beach facilities and have put on hold or cancelled some of the activities at the headquarters.

However, I must reiterate what I said in last month's column. The AOS is debt free, and we will continue that way. We have more than \$1.7 million dollars in restricted funds for programs such as the construction of a library, for research, for annual awards and other projects and we will continue to safeguard these funds as required by law. It is also our intention to remain in our headquarters facility and to maintain our gardens; so much of which has been donated by our membership, so that when we come out of this recession, we can continue to grow as our predecessors originally intended.

The volunteer leadership and staff cannot do this alone. We need your help. We need you to help us reduce our expenses by, for example, renewing your membership immediately when it is due. Do you know that it costs us \$9 for every renewal that it is not done when the first renewal notice is sent? We also need your help in securing new members. This can be done by promoting our organization at your local and regional meetings or at shows and judging. Sometimes, all you have to do is bring a copy of Orchids magazine and show it to your friends. And, most certainly you can help us by making a fully tax deductible, unrestricted contribution to the AOS. Dues alone are not enough to provide all of services listed above.

Monthly Checklist for January and February

(last month this column discussed Cattleyas, Cymbidiums, Lycastes, Odontoglossums, and Paphiopedilums. This month's checklist continues with Phalaenopsis and Zygopetalum.)

Phalaenopsis

Now is the peak of spike development, with the first plants in full flower. Staking and plant preparation is a must for those all-important spring shows. Correct staking now will give a better display and also make it much easier to transport to your society meetings and shows. Care with watering is vital to avoid mechanical damage to the flowers, as well as rot-related problems. Keep spent blooms cleaned up to avoid botrytis inoculation. Do not repot this month. Now you'll be seeing lots of phalaenopsis at orchid shows and sales.

Zygopetalum

For the most part, the flowering season will have ended for this group, providing the grower a chance to do some repotting. The plants will then have a chance to become well established before the hotter months of summer arrive. Most growers use bark mixes, but some exceptional results have been seen lately using rockwool blends. You may want to try this mix, but do not change your whole collection over to this new media until you are sure it is right for you. First, experiment with a few plants to see how they respond.
