The clinic will be conducted by Krum Sotirov, who will bring both plants and mounts. He will demonstrate both the European as well as the Japanese mounting methods.

The cost to members will be reasonable. Mounts, wire and moss will be provided, but bring any pliers, filament, twine, etc. that you may have on hand.

Why Do We Want to Mount Orchids?



Conserving space is one reason. When they are hanging up in the air they are not taking up crowded bench space. But a more important reason is that most orchids are epiphytes, air plants which in nature derive their nutrients from rain, mist, dust and air. They cling to tree limbs, grow on top of rocks, hang from cliffs. Epiphytes like their roots to get

wet and to dry off quickly.

Some grow terrestrially, but they are seldom found growing in pots. So when we grow orchids potted, we are really growing them un-naturally. Orchid medium is a convenience to hold the orchid roots in place, but when it starts to break down it hurts the roots by cutting off the air supply. This problem is eliminated by mounting.

However, one problem introduced by mounting is providing enough moisture to the exposed roots. Dendrobiums, Epidendrums, and Cattleyas are somewhat tolerant of dry roots, and make good candidates for mounting. Phals., Miltonias, Paphs, and Phrags are not as suitable, though they can be mounted if enough humidity is provided.One idea is to grow mounted orchids in a terrarium or Wardian Case. If one of those is not available, Mounted orchids will need to be watered more frequently, with a minimum of two or three thorough soakings per week. Additional misting or syringing in between can be beneficial when humidity is low. In the home, the best method is simply to dunk the entire plant, mount and all into a container of water and let it soak for a few minutes. This gives time for the roots to absorb all of the water they possibly can before removing the plant and allowing it drain.

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This method of watering also makes fertilizing a breeze, since fertilizer can be added to the water.

Krum's Comment on Dolores' Description of her Orchid Room in the Feb. Newsletter

Thank you as always for the wonderful newsletter! I have a comment about Dolores' growing area - something that I am sure everyone wants to hear:

When selecting fluorescent light tubes (or bulbs) there is only one little fact you need to know which will save you a bunch of dollars:

The color of the light is measured in degrees Kelvin (or K) and all light sources are clearly labeled with the value for their color. For example: "Bright White 6500 K"

The specially designed and expensive "plant grow lights" are nothing more than a value that is in the red spectrum. These may be beneficial for the plant growth, but they make the plants look unnatural, which I find to be unsightly.

So here is the fact – the real day light at a bright sunny afternoon is 5400 K

There are fluorescent light tubes sold at Lowes and Home Depot which come pretty close to that - 5500 K Or you could add one tube "Bright White 6500K" plus one "Soft White 4500K" (6500+4500)/2=5500 K-too easy!!

With this value your plants will not only grow best, but you will appreciate their true colors when they are in bloom.

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Paphiopedilum Pinocchio (abstracted from the website of Vivi's Orchid Corner)



(I have this orchid, but it has not favored me with a flower yet. I'm hoping for a bloom this year. Eva)

Paph. Pinocchio is a cross between *Paph. glaucophyllum* and *Paph. primulinum*. This orchid can bloom continuously for a long time given the proper growing environment.

<u>Temperatures:</u> This orchid adapts to South Florida and tolerates warm to intermediate temperatures. During the winter months provide it cooler temps of 13 °c/55 °F. Take caution not to let it get overly hot during summer months.

<u>Watering</u>: Water well and evenly allowing the water to run through. It is best NOT to let the medium dry out between watering. I have however, let it dry out just a tad, but not overly dry for too long. Think - 'more evenly moist'. These orchids do not have pseudobulbs in which to store water. Letting them dry out causes the fine roots to become dry. Watering too much and the roots rot easily. Humidity is important.. if there is little humidity outside, mist your orchids more frequently. A good dose of rainwater does wonders for orchids.

<u>Lighting:</u> Pinocchio does best if it receives some bright indirect light. I give my orchid some sun - morning or afternoon sunlight. Take care not to place the paph in direct sunlight all day long, especially in summer months. They cannot tolerate hot birght sunlight. Light shade is perfect!

<u>Flowers:</u> Wow, look at this beauty! A delicate slipper. The lip is a gorgeous rosy color, with a green cap. Lateral petals are a creamy white color with rosy speckles. Petals twist and turn gracefully and are adorned with fine hairs. What a sight! **Paph. Pinocchio** blooms for a long time - primarily in spring and summer. Flowers are borne on a single stalk and bloom one after another, known as sequential blooming. Paphs have an exotic appearance. These may not be as showy as phalaenopsis or other types of orchids, but **Paph. Pinocchio** certainly stands alone! Appreciate the delicate nature of the flower - that is power of paphs.
