#### Virtual Show Table

Charles Ufford, who manages our website, wanted members to have the following information: This is a repeat of info. published last year, but I bet many members have mislaid the article or forgotten where it is.

While looking through the CNYOS website, I realized that I had not finished creating a user account so that club members could upload pictures to the Virtual Showtable. To go to the Virtual Showtable page, follow the link <a href="http://cnyos.org/virtualshowtable/index.php">http://cnyos.org/virtualshowtable/index.php</a>. Once at this page, click the 'login' button or link towards the upper right of the page. For user enter cnyosmember and the password is baldwinsville. There are two accounts that are similar; cnyos member and cnyosmember. Login to the account cnyosmember (no space in the name). Once logged in as 'cnyosmember', find the 'upload pictures' link towards the top of the page, click this. Once you get to the upload page, select via browsing through your computer the image(s) that you want to upload. Once uploading is finished, then add extra information for each of the orchid information categories. Once you are finished uploading and editing, log out of the account. Very important - once you have uploaded your pictures, send an email to me (charles) at <a href="mailto:uffnet@surfbest.net">uffnet@surfbest.net</a> telling me that you have uploaded pictures. I will then move the image and information to the proper table year's page. This way it's easy to upload pictures and there is no threat of accidentally deleting/altering already submitted images or information. ## **Q&A** from the AOS

# Q.

**Leaf-tip Burn** I've noticed the tips of the leaves of some of my orchids are brown, and guessed it was due to over-fertilizing. This morning, I discovered two small (not tiny) brown spots on a dendrobium leaf. The cane has at least seven to eight leaves, and the spotted one is top-most. By looking at the back of the leaf, I found the center of the brown spots became thinner than the leaf. Are the spots an indication of sunburn or fungus? I have the orchid at an east window, so it shouldn't be receiving too much sun. — *Elizabeth Hsu* 

A. The leaf-tip burn you describe is not unusual in orchids grown in the home or under very dry conditions,

nor is it necessarily indicative of over-fertilizing, but rather of salt-related damage. This occurs when the salt concentration in the soil solution reaches a certain critical point, either through accumulation by over-dry conditions, or by the excess application of fertilizer. Keeping the plants more evenly moist, and flushing thoroughly with clean water can also help to reduce this sort of injury to orchids. I doubt that the symptom you describe on the top leaf is fungus, and even if it is, it sounds like a type that is the result of a secondary infection that is rarely more than a cosmetic problem. Unusually cold water can bruise the softer tissue of a developing leaf, making it susceptible to infection in the same way that a cut on your hand is liable to be infected. The infection usually stops on its own, leaving the type of lesion you describe. — *Ned Nash* 

## **Q**. (Vanilla was for sale at SEPOS. Did any of you buy one?)

**Flowering Vanilla** Have you any suggestions to induce a *Vanilla planifolia* to bloom? My plant is growing well at the warm (80° to 85° F) end of my greenhouse, receives ample light at least six hours a day and is fertilized on a weekly basis. It has twined itself up a center support and has attached itself to the center ridge of the greenhouse. Is this species a notoriously shy bloomer? - *Tom* **Capranica** 

A. Given enough light and space - and I do mean space - vanilla vines will flower regularly. They require at least as much light as cattleyas, and will grow to completely enclose your greenhouse eventually. We had one at my former place of employment that had to have been in aggregate more than 500 feet long that did not flower until we had scrubbed the roof well (the fiberglass was 20 years or more old at the time). Your plant should flower by the time it is nearing 20 feet, possibly this coming spring. - *Ned Nash* 

Q. I have had a problem with soft scale on my cattleya plants for years now, and am wondering how to get rid of this problem once and for all. So far the only solution I have come up with is to throw out badly infested plants.

A #1 You might consider a systemic. Bayer Rose and Flower Spray is a pre-mixed insecticide that is absorbed right into the roots, stems, and leaves of the plant and kills the sucking insects. Use it once every seven days, three times. This should do the buggers in. Works for me.

If you have many plants, look for another Bayer product that has Imaprocolod(not sure of the spelling, but this should be close) and can be diluted.

A #2 I agree that systemics are a plus, but don't think that a single treatment will render the plant "toxic" for very long. The problem with most insecticides, including systemic ones like Orthene and Merit, is that they only kill adults,

leaving eggs, larvae, and pupae to replenish the population. A systemic might kill an adult biting the plant soon after treatment, but after a fairly short period of time, the effect is of no value.

In the past, I have also used an insect growth regulator such as Enstar II, which prevents all stages from maturing, so if you kill the adults, the others won't mature to reproductive adults, and the population will die out eventually.

Lately I have been using a product called SucraShield, which is a certified organic product made from sugar. It is a topical treatment that uses physics to desiccate the critters, rather than being a "toxin" per se, and it works on eggs, larvae, pupae, and adults of soft-bodied insects AND mites!
