# Next Meeting: Tom Nasser of Carolina Orchids will tell us about Angraecums

This genus contains 221 species, some of which are among the most magnificent of all orchids. They do not possess pseudobulbs but have an ever growing monopodial stem or stems. They are quite varied vegetatively and florally and are adapted to dry tropical woodland habitat and have quite fleshy leaves as a consequence. Most are epiphytes, but a few are lithophytes. Tropical Africa and Madagascar contain the majority of the genus with outlying species in southeast Asia. But these orchids can also be found on the Comoros, the Seychelles, and the Mascarenes. They occur between sea level and 2,000 m in humid regions. The long-lasting flowers grow from the leaf axils. They are mostly white, but a few are yellow, green or ochre. They all have a long spur at the back of the lip. On seeing Angraecum sesquipedale, a species from Madagascar, with a 30 cm spur in the lip, Charles Darwin theorized that, since the

a 30 cm spur in the lip, Charles Darwin theorized that, since the nectar was at the bottom of the spur, a pollinator must exist with a tongue at least that long, otherwise the orchid could never be pollinated. At the time, he was not believed. However, long after Darwin's death, the predicted pollinator was discovered, a hawk moth now named Xanthopan morganii praedicta (praedicta meaning predicted). It had an appropriately long proboscis. The specific name 'sesquipedale' means 'one foot and a half', referring to the length of the spur. This is a perfect example of mutual dependence of an orchid and a specific pollinator.

Tom Nasser has a Ph. D. in textile Chemistry, and taught in the field for 20 years. He and his wife Shan started their orchid business in1980. Besides growing and selling orchids, Tom has given talks on bulbo-phyllums and angraecums to many societies for many years. Any CNYOS members who would like to pre-order plants can do so at his website and he will bring them to the meeting.

We will also be taking the speaker out for lunch before the meeting or dinner after. Any clerks or qualified others who inadvertently missed the judges luncheon at the Orchid Show and Sale can attend the lunch/dinner without charge as thanks for their hard work.
